

### **Proud of the Derbyshire Dales**

- Did you know, Matlock Bath was one of the first tourist destinations in the country? Its medicinal spa waters made it a popular rural retreat for late 17th Century visitors and it grew from there to become the popular destination it is today.
- Carsington Water, owned by Severn Trent Water, is the ninth largest reservoir in England. As well as providing the local area's water supply, stored from the River Derwent, it's also a major centre for leisure activities such as watersports, cycling and fishing.
- Hartington Creamery in the White Peak is one of only six places in the world licensed to make Blue Stilton cheese. In fact, the Derbyshire Dales are famous for their artisan foods including the Bakewell Pudding, Dovedale Blue cheese and the Derbyshire oatcake.
